

Matt Tin SLOTOTIN 60

Matt Tin SLOTOTIN 60 is a weak acidic, (pH 3.5 - 5) fluoride free electrolyte for the deposition of matt tin coatings.

Matt Tin SLOTOTIN 60 is used for plating of electronic components with glass or ceramic parts, which would be attacked by conventional strong acid tin electrolytes. Solderability of the tin coatings is still excellent after heat ageing for 16 h/155 °C.

The information in this data sheet is based on laboratory as well as practical experience. Figures quoted for operating limits and replenishment quantities are for guidance. Actual values necessary will depend on the components being plated (material and geometry), their application and plating plant conditions.

The additives required for bath make-up and operation meet the requirements of the RoHS Directive (Restriction of certain Hazardous Substances) relating to the limit of lead, mercury, cadmium, chrome(VI), Polybrominated Biphenyls and Polybrominated Diphenyl Ethers.
